She was a winner of a Giovanni-Steger Poetry Prize, a top ten prize winner for her poem, "Bedroom Collection," in the awards ceremony and celebration of student poetry held by renowned poet Nikki Giovanni and acclaimed Virginia Tech professors. She is the author of a poetry collection, *Cul-de-sac Angels*, a book about home, commonwealth, and belonging, which sold 1000 copies in the first year. She works as Marketing and Publicity Manager at Amplify Publishing Group.


read or to listen. You may interpret the theme any way you'd like. Watch the PSV Facebook page for a flyer with more details.





There's plenty of other poetry excitement going on in the Central Region. Hope to see you around!



(a program initiated by Virginia Poet Laureate, emerita, Luisa A. Igloria, in collaboration with the Poetry Society of Virginia)

Not so long ago, we gave no thought to learning loss. We gave no thought to banning books from public schools that celebrate gender diversity. We gave no thought to the difference between synchronous and asynchronous learning. We did not know what social distancing meant.

Not so long ago, there was not so much hatred in our communities: maskers, anti-maskers, vaxers, anti-vaxers. There was not the outrage felt needing to remind authority that black lives matter.

Not so long ago, there were over a million more of our family and community members who have since died of COVID and tens of thousand of us still suffering its long-term effects. Seemingly, the harder we try to return to pre-pandemic normalcy, the more we feel it slipping through our fingers.

How can we combat the painful sense of isolation, our shared fears and anxieties? How can we convey our concerns and care for each other and the members of our communities?

Most importantly, how can we craft and share messages of hope and determination to build a different world imbued with social justice, care for others (especially those who have been historically marginalized), and care for our own emotional, mental, and physical well-being?

Language is one medium that allows humans to articulate their individuality. Poetry is a particularly powerful expression of this capacity of language. Like the other arts, poetry can touch those places in us where we feel most human; where we are deeply moved, and in turn can move and inspire others.

In an effort to engage young people in their respective communities through the power of poetry-

We will select, from applications, **up to 5 Young Poets in the Community (1 elementary school, 1 middle school, 2 high school, 1 college) in each of the 7 Poetry Society of Virginia regions** (Southeastern, Eastern, Northern, Northwestern, Central, Northern Central, and, Western). Depending on the number and quality of applications and available funding, we may select fewer than the maximum number of poets.

Young Poets will be selected for the relevance and quality of their poems and/or performance presence. In addition, applicants must propose a project which they can carry out during the award year, one which specifically helps enhance awareness and appreciation in their immediate community (including but not only in their schools) of poetry and its role as a tool for social change, community/civic engagement, and emotional well-being. (It doesn't have to be a grand, large-scale project, but it must reach out to and invite the participation of others, using poetry as the central medium.)

Each Young Poet in the Community will work closely with a teacher/mentor from their school or a specifically identified community member to carry out their proposed poetry project before the end of the 2022-23 school year. The mentor may be a teacher, a relative, a friend, a local artist or writer, or someone you respect in the community.

On or before 30 November 2022, Young Poets in the Community applicants will submit:

- 2-3 poems (their best or most representative work)
- A short bio and statement written in third person, describing how they see poetry to be a tool for social change
- An entry form including school and personal contact information, and the name and signature of an identified mentor willing to work with/advise the young poet on their public poetry project
- A short description no longer than 2 paragraphs describing the Young Poets in the Community's proposal for a poetry project with a public aspect, highlighting poetry's role in their community and as a means for strengthening social engagement and emotional well-being. The proposal should include a timeline/target date.

The following awards and a certificate of recognition will be given to poets selected for each of these categories in the different PSV Regions. Young Poets in the Community will also be invited to participate in virtual conversation/reading programs with the VA Poet Laureate to feature and talk about their winning project proposals and to help them grow as young poets.

Just a few examples of public poetry projects:

- Start/propose a regular poetry page in your school newsletter, in your community newspaper, and other similar local publications
- organize classmates in your school and write a group poem on a theme of social relevance or emotional well-being, and brainstorm on how to creatively carry it out (for example, some poets in other counties nationwide did things like write a group poem, 2 lines per person, and then videotape

themselves reading the entire poem put together). Find out how to disseminate to a wider audience - perhaps get in touch with your local radio or TV station?

- Gather friends/classmates (ex: all or select grade levels in your school) and organize a poetry writing
 and distribution project for instance, everyone can write a poetry postcard or letter, based on
 a common theme. Select a theme or themes to assign to each group; each participant can pick
 someone to mail it to in their county, town, or city (you can look in the phone book). You might want
 to contact your local radio or TV or media outlets to help you publicize what you are doing and what
 you hope to achieve
- Organize a poetry reading program in your school or in your community around a theme related to
 community and individual care and social/emotional engagement; for example, partner with a local
 climate/other environmental agency or the zoo or a hydroponics farm or a group interested in clean
 water, clean food, or food sovereignty and ask them to give a talk/tour to you and participating poets
 who will then write poems from that encounter and publicize their outcomes in some way
- Write poetry postcards around a common concern, with invited participants from your community; document (take photos of the postcards and the poems) before actually mailing them to a public official or someone who might be in a position to carry the dialogue on this concern farther or raise it to higher visibility
- Talk to a community organization to see if they might be interested in sponsoring an art+poetry mural in your community; organize and invite other poets and artists in your community to participate
- Create a poetry podcast or conversation project through your school, and invite (a) well-known poet(s) to have a conversation or workshop with you and other students
- Write and share poetry in informal workshops or programs with elders, veterans, and other groups within your community; or collect their stories, and turn them into poems

From Luisa Igloria, Outgoing Poet Laureate for the Commonwealth of Virginia

The Virginia Poets Database is a digital archive of Virginia poets meant to serve as a literary and educational resource, created by **Luisa A. Igloria**, 20th poet Laureate of the Commonwealth of Virginia, with the help of Old Dominion University Libraries and a fellowship from the Academy of American Poets. The website is: https://digitalcommons.odu.edu/virginiapoets/

The Virginia Poets Database aims to feature information on Virginia-born poets, poets who are current residents, and poets who have spent significant time doing literary work in Virginia (for the archive to represent poets of the state as fairly as possible, poets must have resided in the state for more than the duration of their time in a university program). The goal is to feature historically recognized or established poets alongside emerging poets, and spotlight those from underrepresented communities. Further, it aims to gather information that shows the richness and diversity of poetry and poets in the state. The purpose of this database is to create a growing and relevant repository of information on Virginia poets, but by doing so is not making any claims about literary merit. It does not consider itself the steward for literary merit in poetry for the Commonwealth of Virginia. However, since any archive must have clear organizational criteria for it to be meaningful, it asks potential contributors to review the guidelines/criteria for submitting their information for inclusion. There is no fixed deadline for submission. The hope for this archive is to inclusive, although admittedly it cannot be exhaustive—that type of goal cannot be met through a website alone. We look forward to your contributions.

Jeri Rogers Brings Artemis to the Airwaves By Bill Glose

For four decades, Jeri Rogers has been publishing *Artemis Journal*, a literary journal publishing artists and writers from the Blue Ridge Mountains and beyond. Each annual journal features work based on a particular theme (in 2022, the theme was "For love of a book").

Its mission statement can be found on its website at https://artemisjournal.org/: "Borne out of the writing workshops held for the victims of domestic violence in Southwest Virginia, *Artemis Journal* has been an advocate for social justice since 1977. We continue to pay tribute to those foundations today by advocating equal and fair treatment of all. Artemis strongly denounces all forms of discrimination. Whether it is a fight against sexism or racism, Artemis works to elevate the voices of all genders and backgrounds—and to provide a pathway for their art"

For several years, Jeri has been holding launch parties for the journal at the Taubman Museum of Art in Roanoke. However, when COVID hit, she had to pivot and make new plans. She held the launch event online via Zoom and found it to be an enjoyable experience. This led her to expand her reach into the ether and create "Artemis Speaks," a podcast where she speaks with writers and artists who have appeared in the journal; for the writers, she also invites them to read a sample of their work.

A little over a year ago, I had the pleasure to be the featured writer on a call-in interview to discuss my poetry book, *Postscript to War*. This September, I was visiting Roanoke to promote my book of fiction, *All the Ruined Men*, and Jeri thought it would be a great opportunity to sit down together in the studio for a face-to-face chat.

Final Track Studio is the brainchild of Skip Brown, who built a multi-room studio in a repurposed high school gym. The comfortable space has couches and chairs, framed photos of musicians he's produced, and a slew of racked instruments, including a full drum kit, ready for use by any musician in need. While the artists perform, Skip oversees everything from a control room with a colossal mixing board that looks like something out of Star Trek.

Although Skip has one of those honeyed voices with just enough gravel to be perfect for radio, he primarily works behind the scenes as a sound engineer for NPR and for local musicians looking to cut a demo. He also works with film, video, and audio book recordings. Each episode of Artemis Speaks begins with Skip's narration and intro music, a jazzy riff that sets an appropriate artistic mood before Jeri begins her interview.

For my conversation with Jeri, she sat in the room with the drum kit while I was sealed into a separate sound booth. Skip adjusted our individual mic levels and then we were ready to go. Jeri is always well prepared for her interviews and has a list of potential questions, but her style is more conversational and she lets the interview roam to whatever feels natural. From my perspective, even sealed away as I was, it felt like sitting down with an old friend who's really interested in my latest project. Our chat was a joy in a Roanoke weekend filled with wonderful experiences.

A letter to authors:

Wider Perspectives Publishing is partnering with Michael LaMelle of #1 Space to create an Author Fair at Military Circle Mall. If someone cannot stay for that full 5 hours, we ask that an author commit to 3 hours and let us know whether you plan to come later than 3 or leave before the end (so we can keep an eye on balancing the time to keep as many spaces full as possible). Of course if one can be in place for the full 5 hours, that is great. Non-author vendors such as editors, publishers, booksellers and artists will be invited to attend so there should be some great opportunities to network and connect. Cost for an author to participate is \$25. Authors may use up to 6 foot tables. Chairs will be provided by the venue, but you may bring one if you have a comfy chair you prefer. In Memoriam:

Margaret Ward Morland, 1923-2022

Margaret Ward Morland graduated with highest honors from Samford University, pursued graduate studies at Northwestern University, and earned an MA in English from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. She made her home in Lynchburg; she saw much of the world with her sociologist/ anthropologist husband, traveling extensively in Europe and Asia and living in Hong Kong and Taiwan.

Margaret served as Poet Laureate of Virginia from 1996 to 1998. Her poems were published in numerous periodicals and anthologies, including every PSV anthology from the Golden Anniversary in 1973 on, She published two books, *It Happens Thus* (1983), and *Gift of Jade* (1998). More than sixty of her poems were set to music and have been performed by choirs from Bruton Parish Church in Williamsburg, to the quadrennial celebration of Jamestown, to the University of Alaska in Fairbanks. Her list of awards is lengthy.

Throughout her adult life, Margaret shared her love of poetry with others, giving numerous readings and workshops for children and adults, both in this country and abroad, and as an English teacher of literature and creative writing at Samford and Lynchburg University.
